PEARLS for Teen Girls is one of the agencies we are supporting with a grant this year. PEARLS empowers young women with self-development tools, guidance and support to live out the PEARLS values of Personal Responsibility, Empathy, Awareness, Respect, Leadership and Support.

PEARLS programs provide girls with a safe place, skills development and self-esteem building that lead to better life choices and an opportunity to realize their full potential. In 2016, PEARLS served 1,827 girls. Of active girls, 100% chose not to get pregnant and 96% of seniors graduated high school.

group we still have a need. Donna Neal has created a list of what we need by item and the best price we had last year for each item. If you do buy something, tell Donna right away. Forward Committee Report: The Forward Committee was formed one year ago to look at long-term (minimum of three years) service direction for the club. Over the past year, the committee conducted a survey of our membership on current and potential partnership activities, had guest speaker Carmen Pitre speak on issues affecting women and girls, and had at least three facilitated discussions. Thirty-some members completed surveys, for a high participation rate.

We used the same assessment criteria as was used five years ago, with some minor tweaks. Those criteria included: ZI focus, impact on community, gains public interest and attention, gains member interest and attention, helps us be known in the community.

Meeting Minutes for June 28, 2017 (cont.)



Partnership with Neu-Life was assessed against the criteria to evaluate the fit, as the partnership was executed. Half of the survey respondents had visited Neu-Life four or more times.

Early agreements were that we would continue Backpacks, Career Day, Girls on the Run and ARTREACH. In addition, we would explore additional partners. In the meantime, the club worked on the Z Club formation at the Milwaukee High School of the Arts and ARTREACH 2.0.

We have two ARTREACH committees: One committee (of 11 to 12 people) is trained and ready to take ARTREACH on the road. The second committee (5 to 6 people) is looking for locations to take the show.

When looking at expansion opportunities for our service direction, we had three breakout groups at our March meeting to discuss focused topics. Two facilitated discussions converged on mentoring as an outcome. Social Justice discussion raised some potential topics for a club program or discussion.

The Forward Committee will be turning the work over to a Mentoring Committee: Maria Bellmann, Victoria Frazier, Janet Kloser, Deb Koller, Cheryl Lucas-DeBerry, Joyce McCrary and La Toya Sykes. The Mentoring Committee will be charged with making recommendations on what the service initiative would look like, what the scope would involve (Z Club, Sojourner Peace Center, and/or others), training needs, and the match with the club capacity. Cheryl and La Toya will lead the committee.

Learning More About Our Zonta Sisters Around the World - India

A reading suggestion to put you in touch with the culture of India: Nectar in a Sieve by Kamala Markandaya

Nectar in a Sieve is a beautiful and eloquent story which tells of a simple peasant woman in a primitive village in India whose whole life is a gallant and persistent battle to care for those she loves. The Milwaukee Journal named it "A Novel to Retain in Your Heart." It was named Notable Book of 1955 by the American Library Association.

Kamala Markandaya (1924–2004), a pseudonym used by Kamala Purnaiya Taylor, was an Indian novelist and journalist. She was born in Bangalore, India, and educated at the University of Madras in Chennai, India. She worked briefly for a weekly newspaper before emigrating to England in 1948 where she lived and met her husband. *Nectar in a Sieve* was her first novel. Her other books include *A Handful of Rice*, *Some Inner Fury*, *The Golden Honeycomb*, and *Two Virgins*.

Zonta International has three clubs in India: Bombay I, Bombay III, and Madras.




Finally, thanks to our Career Day speakers – Joyce, Montez, and Regina – for being such great role models and sharing their work experiences with the Neu-Life youth.

Legislation Update



Senate Committee Approves Human Trafficking Bills

An Update from the Women's Congressional Policy Institute

On August 2, the Senate Commerce, Science and Transportation Committee passed, by voice vote, S. 1532, the No Human Trafficking on Our Roads Act, and S. 1536, the Combatting Human Trafficking in Commercial Vehicles Act, as amended.

- **S. 1532**: Sponsored by Sen. John Thune (R-SD), the measure would "disqualify from operating a commercial motor vehicle for life an individual who uses a commercial motor vehicle in committing a felony involving human trafficking."
- **S. 1536**: Sponsored by Sen. Amy Klobuchar (D-MN), the bill would "designate a human trafficking prevention coordinator and expand the scope of activities authorized under the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration's outreach and education program to include human trafficking prevention activities."

Women, Peace, and Security Act Clears Senate

An Update from the Women's Congressional Policy Institute

On August 3, the Senate approved, by voice vote, **S. 1141**, the Women, Peace, and Security Act of 2017, sponsored by Sen. Jeanne Shaheen (D-NH). The bill would ensure that the United States promotes the "meaningful participation of women in mediation and negotiation processes seeking to prevent, mitigate, or resolve conflict."

The Senate Foreign Relations Committee approved the bill on May 25. The House approved its version of the bill (H.R. 2484), sponsored by Rep. Kristi Noem (R-SD), on June 20.

Jane M. Klausman Women in Business Scholarship Recipient (\$1,000)

ANNA SCHREIBER

The Jane M. Klausman Women in Business Scholarship is awarded to women undertaking business studies who have demonstrated outstanding potential in the field. This year's recipient is Anna Schreiber, who is studying Information Systems in the Management Department at Marquette University.

As Anna described her field in her application essay, "The program I am enrolled in at Marquette University is critical to the business field, in fact, I would say that any business without IT is not really a business at all. Especially in the world that we live in today, IT is what makes a business run and serves as the platform for people to do their jobs. As IT professionals, we are responsible for helping people use technology in efficient and intelligent ways to solve problems. Over the next few years, technology will only continue to evolve, so the IT field will help businesses learn the right ways to apply it."

Anna has taken a leadership role as co-president of the Information Technology Student Organization at Marquette and co-editor of that organization's publications. She was awarded Most Valuable Team Player in Marquette's IT Innovation competition, InnovalT, and as a business analyst intern at Robert W. Baird her team won the Intern Case Competition—with a program that will most likely be implemented at the company.

In addition to praising Anna's instrumental work on the initiative she was assigned to during her internship, her coach and mentor at Baird commented, "She has...exhibited an ability to quickly build relationships, which was imperative in her role as a liaison between business users and IT.... She is clearly a very self-motivated person and this comes across in how she approaches her professional work as well as her coursework and school obligations such as her leadership of the Marquette IT Student Organization."

Her recommendation from a professor at Marquette also commented on her ability to engage: "Anna is very collaborative and she tends to uplift members of her peer group with her positive attitude and archetypical leadership style. She is accountable to her team and she expects the same level of accountability of her team members."

Anna will likely be joining us at our August meeting, so we can all offer her our congratulations on her achievements so far, and on her receipt of the Zonta Club of Milwaukee's Jane M. Klausman Woman in Business Scholarship.

Women in STEM Scholarship Recipient (\$1,000)

BIANCA RUFFOLO

Women majoring in Science, Technology, Engineering or Math (STEM) at an accredited college or university who show outstanding potential in their chosen field are eligible to apply for this \$1,000 scholarship offered by the Zonta Club of Milwaukee.

The 2017 recipient, Bianca Ruffolo, is pursuing a degree in Molecular Biology and Bioinformatics at University of Wisconsin-Parkside. Her goal is to ultimately become a molecular pathologist physician/scientist, pursuing both a medical practice and research work.

Through her program at UW-Parkside, Bianca will spend two years working with a microbiologist in the glucose-phosphate stress of E. coli. Her program also allows her to do medically relevant research through the RUSCH program at the University of Wisconsin-Madison; she is focusing on hematology oncology research. Bianca says, "What's most exciting about this program is that its purpose is to groom students toward helping underserved populations in Wisconsin; I want to focus on women's health research and poor rural communities, since these have been an underserved field for too long."

In addition to maintaining a 4.0 GPA in her academics, Bianca is a member of Phi Eta Sigma Honor Society and the Pre-Health Club and president of the Molecular Biology Club and Circle K. Her participation in Phi Eta Sigma and Circle K involves community service projects, including Parkside's GEMS conference. One of Bianca's favorite volunteer opportunities, GEMS (Girls Empowered by Math and Science) is designed to involve more young women in STEM fields. Bianca was also chosen to be a Newman Civic Fellowship Member, and is the Molecular Biology and Bioinformatics representative for the College of Natural and Health Sciences Advisory Board, which discusses issues and possible solutions in the college. For a campus Harry Potter Trivia Challenge that she conceptualized and implemented for the four colleges of the Parkside campus, she has also been recognized for Innovative Program of the Year

Outside of the Parkside campus, she is a Comfort Cart driver for Ascension Hospital in Racine, tutors introductory biology at her old high school, and serves at her church.

Bianca is expected to join us at our August meeting, where we can all learn more about her achievements and goals and congratulate her on receiving the Zonta Club of Milwaukee's Women in STEM Scholarship.
