Helen Ludwig, President, called the meeting to order.

District Governor: A welcome was extended to Tammy Hagen, District 6 Governor, who shared a few words. Pam Duane (Area Director) also joined us for the meeting. Tammy asked that all Zontians be engaged members, both locally and beyond. Spring Workshop will be hosted by Zonta Club of Beloit in April. Zonta Zing is March 4, a fundraiser hosted by Zonta Club of Madison. Tickets to the Zing are available online through Eventbrite.

Z Club Presentation: Tammy Hagen presented the charter for our Milwaukee High School of the Arts (MHSA) Female Empowerment Movement (FEM) – Z Club to Joann Harris-Comodore, chair of the Z Club Committee.

Treasurer's Report: As of end of December, the checking balance was \$10,870.26 and the Waterstone Bank CD was \$5,010.37.

Advocacy: The Madison Club is again doing an International Women's Day advocacy training on Saturday, February 25, at Madison Memorial High School. On Wednesday, March 8, in the afternoon you can meet with your state representative at the WI State Capitol.

ARTREACH: Donna Neal introduced ARTREACH 2.0. We are at a point now where we have 14 paintings on human trafficking, and we are ready to take the show on the road. Our plan is to make our efforts a little more intentional and organized. This is a hands-on volunteer opportunity to be trained and speak to the ARTREACH program, along with the topic of human trafficking. Our members will be the manpower behind the events where the paintings are displayed and members speak our message. Two opportunities are coming up to observe and learn how to present. See Donna and Jody Rhodes to attend. Volunteers for this training are requested from our club. Also, an I94 campaign from Chicago to Milwaukee will be coming, where nearly every billboard will be taken over to raise awareness on human trafficking.

Fashion Show: Our annual fundraiser is fast approaching – April 1 at Milwaukee Marriott West. We are asking all members to try to bring a table of 10 guests. Please plan to help the day of the event, donate towards the wine pull, provide for raffle baskets, and enthusiastically participate in the event. Program: Our speaker next month will be Carmen Pitre from Sojourner Family Peace Center.

Scholarship: Young Women in Public Affairs scholarship applications are due March 15.

Service: Thank you from Neu-Life for the Christmas gifts. Jody Rhodes worked with the artist to update the art room mural based on feedback from our December meeting. A few further minor changes were suggested at the January meeting, otherwise the mural looks great. Two dates, February 18 and March 18, were proposed for the mural painting, likely a 10:00am to 1:00pm time frame. The final date will be provided to the club.

At the January meeting, we gave Jody Rhodes final feedback on the mural design for the art room wall at Neu-Life.


We will schedule the painting day for either February 18 or March 18. The date will likely be determined before you get this newsletter.

On Fashion, Femininity, & Feminism



One of the most inspiring feminist writers and thinkers of our time is Nigerian-born Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie. If you don't know her, I strongly encourage you to read her latest novel, *Americanah*, or read her essay "We Should All Be Feminists."

If you don't have the time at the moment, and need a little inspiration to get you excited about our upcoming fashion show fundraiser, check out Adichie's 2015 Wellesley College commencement address at:

In the address, Adichie shares several personal stories and "an ode to the power of make-up" and its "possibilities for temporary transformation." She makes the point that feminist "rules" may not always apply: "Gender is always about context and circumstance; your standardized ideologies will not always fit your life, because life is messy." Take a listen; it's 20 minutes extremely well spent. And it's about lots besides make-up.

Toward the end of an interview headlined "Refugees, Race, and Americanah" with Mary Louise Kelly of FORA.tv (<u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=CKodkVJR8DE</u>), Adichie was asked about her Wellesley address. She responded: "I refuse to accept that femininity and feminism are mutually exclusive."

Now, let's pull out all the stops in support of our annual fashion show fundraiser – to exceed our objective of 300 attendees and \$23,000 in funds raised!

On January 26, ARTREACH paintings were displayed at the Human Trafficking Task Force of Greater Milwaukee annual Human Trafficking Awareness Month event, held at Radio 88Nine headquarters downtown and attended by approximately 120 people.

On February 3, ARTREACH paintings were displayed at the 2nd Annual Night of Freedom fundraiser sponsored by the Racine Coalition Against Human Trafficking, now called Fight to End Exploitation. About 100 people attended this event. We had several very interesting conversations and met some people doing great work. We expect a few new placements to come out of these events.

We are also working on updating the ARTREACH curriculum for implementation this spring at the Neu-Life main site and this summer at Milwaukee High School for the Arts.

Our International Service Project in Nepal

Our Zonta International Strategies to End Violence Against Women (ZISVAW) Project "Addressing Human Trafficking and Unsafe Migration in Nepal" provides \$1,000,000 to UN Women (previously known as UNIFEM) and the UN Trust Fund* to create a foundation for addressing Nepal's human trafficking and foreign labor migration issues which the government of Nepal is committed to address.

*The UN Trust Fund is a leading multinational grant-making mechanism dedicated to addressing violence. Since the 1960s, approximately 41% of all Zonta funds from Zonta International have been utilized in projects in cooperation with UN Women and the UN Trust Fund.

A Shopping Tip Regarding Nepal

Nepal experienced a 7.6 magnitude earthquake on April 25, 2015, was followed by 400 major aftershocks through November 2015. Total losses and damages caused by the quake were enormous: 9,000 people lost their lives, 22,000 were injured, and more than 900,000 houses, 8,000 schools and 1,000 health centers were destroyed.

Aveda (owned by Estee Lauder Companies Inc.) products sport green paper on their holiday specialty gift products. This is "lokta" paper and is made by citizens of Nepal's rural communities which Aveda has partnered with since 2007. With a portion of Aveda funding, one of the areas devastated by the earthquake has been the beneficiary of a brick-making machine that uses 90% local clay and 10% cement, with the goal of producing more earthquake-resistant homes. Multiple clean drinking water projects, supported by previous Aveda grants, sustained zero damage from the earthquake due to their sound construction. Selected Readings on Nepal

The Snow Leopard by Peter Matthiessen, 1978 (Winner of the National Book Award)

In 1973, Peter Matthiessen and field biologist George Schaller traveled high into the mountains of Nepal to study the Himalayan blue sheep and possibly glimpse the rare and beautiful snow leopard. Matthiessen, a student of Zen Buddhism, was also on a spiritual quest to find the Lama of Shey at the ancient shrine on Crystal Mountain. As the climb proceeds, Matthiessen charts his inner path as well as his outer one, with a deepening Buddhist understanding of reality, suffering, impermanence and beauty. Arresting God in Kathmandu by Samarat Upadhyay, 2001

Samrat Upadhyay was born and raised in Kathmandu and came to the United States at age 21. He lives with his wife and daughter near Cleveland where he teaches at Baldwin-Wallace College. He is the first Nepali author writing in English to be published in the West. *Arresting God in Kathmandu* explores the nature of desire and spirituality in a changing society. Upadhyay records the echoes of modernization throughout love and family . . . In a city where gods are omnipresent, where privacy is elusive and family defines identity; the men and women of this novel find themselves at the mercy of their desires but at the will of their society.
