OUR NEWEST MEMBER AND OUR SEPTEMBER SPEAKER:

DEBBIE BUCHANAN

Debbie was born in Arkansas and moved to Milwaukee with her family in 1970. After she graduated from high school she enlisted in the U.S. Army, where she trained and worked as an administrative assistant for the Carl R. Darnall Army Medical Center in Killeen, Texas. After four years of military service, she returned to Wisconsin and accepted a position as a Health Unit Coordinator for Sinai Samaritan Hospital.



During her tenure at Sinai Samaritan, she was exposed to cases of domestic violence and sexual assault against women and children; high rates of unemployment; gaps in the education system; and increasing numbers of incarceration among people of color. After witnessing how these issues negatively impacted the community, she was incited to seek a job where she could make a difference in the lives of others.

In 1994, Debbie accepted a position with the Right Alternative Family Center as an Employment Specialist, where she taught computer technology, basic office skills, and resume writing to single mothers that resided in Milwaukee's low-income housing. Debbie had no idea this would be the beginning of her career (24 years and counting) in the non-profit sector!

Debbie spent the first half of her career in case management and workforce development, where she trained and secured jobs for over 500 women and men. By 2000 Debbie's career elevated to non-profit management roles to include director of a 24-hour crisis facility and associate director. While working full-time, Debbie attended college in the evenings at MATC and Cardinal Stritch University, completing degrees in Supervisory Management and Human Services.

In October 2017, Debbie accepted a position as the Executive Director for the Milwaukee Homeless Veterans Initiative (MHVI). She has now come full circle returning to where her journey began as a veteran.

Racial Justice Committee



The August Club meeting program was put together by the Racial Justice Committee and emceed by committee member Krista Betts. Over dinner, club members discussed "Why is racism a barrier to the empowerment of women?" We set clear ground rules for those conversations, ones we have agreed on and followed in our own committee discussions: talking of our own personal experience, not speaking for any group, listening carefully, not judging, and maintaining privacy. (Ask a committee member for the full ground rules if you would like to have them.)

The program included a video on the GI Bill, institutional racism, and its effects on generations of African-Americans to this day (<u>LINK</u>); Karen Hunt's personal story on the effect of that GI Bill on her life; and a follow-up large-group discussion. The discussion was rich, deep, and personal. We are off to a good start!

Although the meeting started 45 minutes late & was a bit chaotic at times, I believe that it was one of the best we've ever had. Members freely shared experiences and insights and, even though it was 9:00, they were in no great hurry to leave.

My table's members shared experiences of growing up in a white family, white neighborhood, white schools, etc., where they saw a fear of other races exhibited by family members. These fears thus limited the empowerment of their mothers. In the case of a black family, their fears for the safety of their children (and rightly so) required a complex set of rules to be followed to avoid being hassled by a white society. This was not just an extra layer of challenges, it was a parallel universe.

UN Committee



At the Convention in Yokahama, Japan, at the Club President's Leadership Training, the Zonta Club of Melbourne on Yarra (Area 1, District 23) presented an initiative to "toast" other clubs around the world at monthly club meetings. Each month a club member is invited to select a club and to research how that club operates and share the gathered insights at a meeting. Contact with the selected club should focus on their location, why the club was chosen, background and history on the club, service and advocacy projects and any other pertinent pieces of information. At the close of comments, glasses will be raised in a "toast" to that club.

Our President has asked that I present this idea to our club and "toast" my selected club with the thought that we could adopt this idea with other members making the selection in coming months. Melbourne has found that it is an excellent way for all of us to expand our knowledge and view of the Zonta world.

I have selected the Zonta Club in Dakhar, Bangladesh. Bangladesh will be one of the 12 countries that will be beneficiaries of our ZISVAW project, along with Burkina Faso, Ethiopia, Ghana, India, Mozambique, Nepal, Niger, Sierra Leone, Uganda, Yemen, and Zambia. Zonta International has pledged \$2,000,000 to UNICEF USA in support of UNICEF/UNFPA's Global Programme to Accelerate Action to End Child Marriage.

Worldwide, almost 650 million women alive today were married before their 18th birthday and an estimated 280 million more girls are at risk of becoming brides. If current trends continue, the number of girls and women married as children will reach nearly 1 billion by 2030.

Child marriage is a global violation of human rights that can be found in cultures, religions, ethnicities and countries around the world.

The five main strategies of the program are:

- 1. Building the skills and knowledge of girls at risk of child marriage.
- 2. Supporting households in demonstrating positive attitudes towards adolescent girls.
- 3. Strengthening the systems that deliver services to adolescent girls.
- 4. Ensuring laws and policies protect and promote adolescent girls' rights.
- 5. Generating and using robust data to inform programs and policies relating to adolescent girls.

Expected outcomes are:

- 1. National laws, policy frameworks and mechanisms to protect and promote adolescent girls' rights are in line with international standards and properly resourced.
- 2. Government(s) and partners within and across countries support the generation and use of robust data and evidence to inform policy and programming, track progress and document lessons.
- 3. Relevant regional and local government ministries deliver quality and cost-effective services to meet the needs of adolescent girls.
- 4. Households demonstrate positive attitudes and behaviors toward investing in and supporting adolescent girls.
- 5. Adolescent girls at risk of or affected by child marriage are better able to express and exercise their choices.
