The meeting was called to order at 6:05pm by President Elect Karen Smith. One guest was present.

**International Toast:** Jackie Beaudry toasted the Zonta Club of Batavia-Genesee County, New York. The club was chartered in April of 1958 with 28 members. They have extensive activities that include service projects and scholarships. November 10-11 they will hold their annual Holiday Fest. Jackie chose this club to toast because it is the first Zonta club she joined, in 1974. The toast was given.

**Program:** Jarrett Luckett, Executive Director of Exploit No More, an organization dedicated to ending child sex trafficking in the Greater Milwaukee region. Their focus is awareness, advocacy and aftercare, which he expanded on. They have a website and a communications sign-up sheet was passed around. A \$50 donation was made on behalf of the club.

**Tabletop Discussion:** The 10-minute discussion was on the subject, "what movie have you seen that changed your perspective regarding racism?"

Treasurer's Report – Lori Peterson: As of October 5, 2018:

- CD value is \$5,162.84

#### **Committee Reports**

- Fashion Show Lynne Oehlke: Last show raised \$27,045.00. Goal for 2019 is to match or exceed. Theme is "Still Fashionable After 100 Years, Still Empowering Women and Girls." Members were asked to consider corporate sponsors as well as folks they do business with such as doctors, dentists, financial planners, etc., in order to double the number of sponsors from last year. Also asking for action type auction items such as cabins, trips, etc. Took a few minutes to brainstorm at tables.
- **Public Relations Joni Reese:** Silent Walk was completed, but with lower participation than we had hoped. Photos from the walk were posted on Facebook; Cheryl Lucas-DeBerry was on television promoting the event, and the segment has also been posted to Facebook. Pictures have been taken of the mini project items for posting. We plan to donate 50 gifts for Neu-Life for Christmas; Lori Peterson will coordinate.
- Scholarship Krista Betts: No activity since last meeting. Applications for the Young Women in Public Affairs (YWPA) Award will be updated and posted by the next club meeting; applications are due in the spring.
- **Z Club Joann Comodore:** The first Z Club meeting of the year was held last week. There are all new girls, and many are seniors. There were 17 girls present for the 30-minute meeting.
- **Membership Cheryl Lucas-DeBerry:** Welcomed newest member Debbie Buchanan. Urged members to invite guests.

# Field Trip: YWCA Evening to Promote Racial Justice

The Racial Justice Committee invites all of our Zonta sisters to join us at the Marcus Center for the Performing Arts on December 4 for YWCA's 14th Annual Evening to Promote Racial Justice, **Women Behind Campaigns: Racism & Sexism in Politics**. The event is filled with music, food, recognition of local trailblazers and a keynote address.

This year, the keynote speaker is Ms. Symone Sanders. A champion for women, Symone D. Sanders is a strategist, communications consultant, CNN Political Commentator and served as a Spring 2018 Resident Fellow at Harvard's Institute of Politics at the Kennedy School. Symone rose to prominence during her tenure as the National Press Secretary for U.S. Sen. Bernie Sanders' presidential campaign. At 25, Symone



demonstrated an uncanny command of the issues, earning her a place in history as the youngest presidential press secretary on record and a spot on *Rolling Stone Magazine*'s list of 16 young Americans shaping the 2016 election.

Again, our focus is on early marriage. From the Zonta International Foundation website:

"Worldwide, almost 650 million women alive today were married before their 18th birthday and an estimated 280 million more girls are at risk of becoming brides. If current trends continue, the number of girls and women married as children will reach nearly 1 billion by 2030.

"[On September 26], in support of ending child marriage, Zonta International President Susanne von Bassewitz made a statement at a high-level side event on eliminating child marriage in Africa at the United Nations General Assembly. The event, organized by the permanent missions of Canada and Zambia to the United Nations, UNICEF, UNFPA and UN Women, engaged African Heads of State and Governments in a dialogue on child, early and forced marriage with the goal of renewing commitments to implement national strategies to end child, early and forced marriage."

# Suggested Reading: Buried Beneath the Baobab Tree by Adaobi Tricia Nwaubani / afterward by Viviana Mazza

On April 24, 2014, Boko Haram kidnapped 276 girls at their school in Nigeria. Some managed to escape. Many are still missing. This novel is based on the experiences of the young women who were captured by Boko Haram. Their accounts are told in stark, poetic vignettes and prove a harrowing story of survival and hope in the darkest of places. The concluding "Afterword: The Chosen Generation" written by Italian journalist Viviana Mazza is an accounting of the actual harrowing event.

While Nigeria is not a country with which ZI is currently working, the goal of Boko Haram is to create an Islamic state in northern Nigeria, which is bordered by Cameroon, Chad, Benin and Niger. Niger is a country addressed in ZI's "Ending Child Marriage" project with UNICEF and UNFPA, joining forces and formally launching a multi-country initiative to protect the rights of millions of the world's most vulnerable girls. Many of those captured by Boko Haram have been forced into early marriage.

# Legislative Update

## Women and Minorities in STEM

On October 11, the U.S. Senate approved, by unanimous consent, H.R. 6758, the Study of Underrepresented Classes Chasing Engineering and Science Success (SUCCESS) Act, clearing the bill for the president's signature. The House passed the legislation on September 25.

The measure would require the U.S. Patent Office and the Small Business Administration to study efforts to increase the number of women and minorities applying for and obtaining patents, and participating in entrepreneurship activities.
