# Speakers: Jody Rhodes, Executive Director, and Tracy Hranoja, Director of Strategy and Innovation, Neu-Life Community Development

Established in 2000, Neu-Life Community Development offers development programs for youth ages 3 to 18+ primarily from the 53205/53206 ZIP codes. Their mission is to empower youth with skills and strategies to make better life choices. The Zonta Club of Milwaukee had a formal partnership with Neu-Life for 5 years involving service, advocacy, and financial support, and has maintained an informal partnership with them for the past couple of years.

Neu-Life programming, goals, and vision have changed and grown dramatically since the start of our partnership. Jody and Tracy, well known to many of us but new to many as well, will share the major current initiatives and future plans. The Youth Work Innovation Center and workforce and career development programming are central, as are the Farmfork Culinary Arts Program and STEPP (Sex Trafficking Education and Prevention Program, an evolution of ARTREACH).

### Women in Aviation



January 11th of each year is Zonta International's recognition of Amelia Earhart's accomplishments and her empowerment of women in science.

"On this day in 1935, legendary pilot Amelia Earhart embarked on a 2,408-mile trip from Honolulu, Hawaii to Oakland, California. The next day, she became the first person to fly solo to the United States mainland from Hawaii. Since she had flown over the Atlantic Ocean five years earlier, this flight also made her the first person to fly across both the Pacific and Atlantic oceans."

In the early 20th century, Amelia wasn't the only woman who dreamed of flying. This is an excerpt from the National Women's History Museum's tribute to **Bessie Colemen** (1892-1926) written by Kerri Lee Alexander.

Bessie Coleman soared across the sky as the first African American, and the first Native American woman pilot. Known for performing flying tricks, Coleman's nicknames were; "Brave Bessie," "Queen Bess," and "The Only Race Aviatrix in the World." Her goal was to encourage women and African Americans to reach their dreams.

Born in Atlanta, Texas on January 26, 1892, Bessie Coleman had twelve brothers and sisters. Her mother, Susan Coleman, was an African American maid, and her father George Coleman was a Native American sharecropper. Her brothers served in the military during World War I and came home with stories from their time in France. Her brother John teased her because French women were allowed to learn how to fly airplanes and Bessie could not. This made Bessie want to become a pilot. She applied to many flight schools across the country, but no school would take her because she was both African American and a woman. Famous African American newspaper publisher, Robert Abbott told her to move to France where she could learn how to fly. She began taking French classes at night because her application to flight schools needed to be written in French.

Finally, Coleman was accepted at the Caudron Brothers' School of Aviation in Le Crotoy, France. She received her international pilot's license on June 15, 1921 from the Fédération Aéronautique Internationale. She gave speeches and showed films of her air tricks in churches, theaters, and schools to earn money. She refused to speak anywhere that was segregated or discriminated against African Americans.

Unfortunately, her career ended with a tragic plane crash, but her life continues to inspire people around the world.

## Zonta Says NO to Violence Against Women



A Wisconsin teenager, Chrystul Kizer, is facing life in prison on charges of murdering her alleged sex trafficker. As reported in the *Milwaukee Journal-Sentinel*,

[Chrystul's] case comes at a time when police and prosecutors across the country are reevaluating how victims of sex trafficking should be treated. This year, Tennessee released Cyntoia Brown, whose story went viral in the midst of the #MeToo movement. She went to prison at age 16 and served 15 years for killing a man who purchased her for sex.

Brown's story, along with the downfall of financier Jeffrey Epstein and singer R. Kelly, reveal what most child sex trafficking actually looks like in America: vulnerable kids, not kidnapped and held captive, not chained and smuggled across borders, but groomed by someone they trust and manipulated into believing they are the ones to blame for the abuse.

Under federal law, all children who are bought or sold for sex are trafficking victims, regardless of the circumstances. Thirty states and the District of Columbia have stopped charging minors with prostitution.

Most states also have a law that gives sex-trafficking victims an "affirmative defense." If they can prove at trial they committed a crime because they were being trafficked, they can be acquitted of certain charges against them.

Wisconsin is one of those states — and Chrystul wanted to use that law to defend her actions. Despite prosecutors' certainty that her crime was premeditated, her lawyer argues she still has a complete defense to the charges.

But the affirmative defense law has never been used in a homicide or any other violent crime. Not in Wisconsin and, as far as advocates know, not anywhere else."

The Human Trafficking Task Force of Greater Milwaukee is expected to look into this case further and propose recommendations for action.
