Service and Advocacy:

September 2020



- **Covid 19 Fundraiser:** Joni Reese reported that we are waiting for an update from Elizabeth Stull for the final amount remaining for the Covid 19 relief to determine the final distribution of the remaining funds.
- Zonta Says No March Walk: Donna Neal reported the options for replacing the Walk:
  - End Abuse will be issuing the homicide report and will have a non-event gala, "Soar Above" on 9/22/2020. They have requested we support the gala. Sponsorship levels range from \$500 \$5,000. Janet Kloser moved that we pay \$750.00 from club funds to support the gala. Lynn Oehlke seconded. After further discussion, the motion passed unanimously.
  - We will post on social media in October (Stop Domestic Violence month) several of the personal stories from the End Abuse report.
  - Sojourner Family Peace Center has a "#untilshecan" where individuals read survivor's stories. We will repost some of those stories in October.
  - End Abuse has a short video "Dare to Know" program. We can publish the video or a link to it.
  - We can post a link to the domestic violence report issued in the Journal Sentinel related to domestic violence as a result of Covid 19.
  - Donna is waiting to hear back from the Waukesha Women's Center regarding to their purple silhouettes and how we can support that program.
- **Racial Justice:** Donna Neal reported that the racial justice committee will be meeting on August 27 to come up with some directions for the club. She also recommended members read a letter called "Moment of Truth".
- End Early Marriage: Diane Lindsley reported that the Madison Club is concentrating on Ending Child Marriage. Diane will ask if there is any pending legislation in Wisconsin that we should support.
- **District 6 Service Liason:** Joni reported that Tamara Hagen is the District 6 service liaison. Donna Conant reported to her our Covid 19 and backpack projects.



# **Club Statement of Solidarity to Eliminate Systemic Racism**

We are living in challenging times. The COVID19 virus demands a response and the Zonta Club of Milwaukee put an emergency giving plan in place in June. However, it's not an accident that the incidence of virus and deaths are disproportionately impacting people of color in hyper -segregated Milwaukee as well as the rest of the US. It's the result of systemic racism that puts people of color at risk -- health, education, economics, judicial, etc. - and prevents them from reaching full potential. It's time we recognized systemic racism as a key barrier to the empowerment of women and families.

Systemic racism is the chief barrier to the empowerment of women in much of the world and, in this country, black American women and girls in particular. As an organization dedicated to the empowerment of women and girls, it is incumbent on us to not only make a public statement against racism but also to advocate actions to eliminate it, now and on an ongoing basis.

Empowering women and girls must mean all women and girls. Without racial justice, real empowerment is impossible. Let us work to eliminate racism as a barrier to the empowerment of women and girls.

## **Racial Justice Committee Follow-Ups**

The Racial Justice Committee has developed a program for Milwaukee (and possibly Madison) Club meetings that is a shorter version of the program put together for the Spring Area Workshop that had to be cancelled. We'll work with the Board and the Program Committee to find a date.

We are also designing some optional virtual gatherings for Club members, where small groups can participate in a discussion on issues related to systemic racism, stimulated by a video, book, film, article, etc. We are developing a schedule of bi-monthly events and plan to announce them in the next newsletter.

We are also brainstorming possible Club project ideas.

## **Domestic Violence Awareness Month**

2020 has been one of the hardest years in recent history. The pandemic has highlighted the challenges domestic abuse victims and survivors face each day. Safer at Home mandates across the nation sparked an increase in domestic abuse incidents, due to loss of income, isolation, and being in an enclosed space with an abusive partner.

These stressors, exacerbated by the spread of COVID-19, put victims and their children at a higher risk of being murdered by their abusers. A May 2020 report from the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel on the spike in homicides in Milwaukee linked nearly half of them to domestic or family violence. *There is a direct correlation between the pandemic and an increase in domestic violence*. Victims across WI need your help.

End Abuse Wisconsin has been tracking domestic violence homicides for the last 20 years. They have been our partner in our annual Zonta Says No to Domestic Violence Silent March for the past 4 years. Each year they publish a Homicide Report with the statistics and stories of all homicides from the prior year.

Their <u>Homicide Reports</u> paint a grim picture of the ultimate price victims and their families pay as a result of domestic abuse.

In lieu of an in-person fundraiser this year, End Abuse Wisconsin is sponsoring a "non-event gala" called **Soar Above At Home** on Tuesday, September 22 to support survivors and victims. The Zonta Club of Milwaukee is sponsoring this event and we encourage our members to participate to the extent they can. Together, we can effectuate a lasting transformation that will positively impact victims, survivors, and the families of homicide victims, and – most importantly – prevent future homicides. ## Women's Suffrage Movement

We are all familiar with the 19<sup>th</sup> Amendment which, after 70 years of protests and demonstrations, ensured women the right to vote.

However, not all women were able to vote because the 19<sup>th</sup> Amendment only prohibited discrimination based upon a person's sex but not race.

#### In the PBS video "SHE RESISTED: Strategies of Suffrage" found at

<u>https://www.pbs.org/wgbh/americanexperience/interactives/she-resisted/sb/introduction/1</u>, you will learn of the struggles faced by women of color, Asian American women, Native American women, and Latin American women. These are the stories that most of us were never taught.

When the 19<sup>th</sup> Amendment was passed in 1920, Native Americans were not allowed US citizenship. Ironically, early on in the suffrage movement, white women became familiar with equal rights held by women in certain Native American tribes but white women did not advocate for their citizenship or the right to vote. The Snyder

Act of 1924 granted citizenship to Native Americans but certain states prevented their voting by requiring literacy tests, poll taxes, and declaring that a reservation was not a part of a state.

Although African American women in the north were able to vote after the passage of the 19<sup>th</sup> Amendment, many in other parts of the country could not. Poll taxes, literacy tests, intimidation and violence suppressed their votes. The Voting Rights Act of 1965 ensured voting rights for all.

Asian-Americans born in the US were citizens in 1920 but their parents were not. It was not until 1952, when the Immigration and Nationality Act was passed, could first generation Asian-Americans become US citizens and vote.

Latinas in Puerto Rico who were literate in English could vote in 1929 but illiterate women had to wait until 1935. However, literacy tests continued to be required until 1975 when the Voting Rights Act was extended to women who spoke languages other than English.

## The Beijing's Women Conference: 25 years later, The Council of Europe Istanbul Convention, the CEDAW treaty, and the Equal Rights Amendment

On October 1<sup>st</sup> of this year the President of the General Assembly, Tijjani Muhammad-Bande, will convene a High-Level meeting on the 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the *Beijing Platform for Action* during which Member States can re-commit to a gender-equal world. This **Fourth World Conference on Women** can be accessed at <u>https://www.un.org/womenwatch/daw/beijing/platform/</u> Our own Club member, Aileen Rock-Jordan, attended the parallel conference for non-governmental organizations held outside of Beijing in 1995.

"On this important anniversary, let us reaffirm the promises the world made to women and girls in 1995. Let us draw on the activist spirit of the Beijing Conference and commit to forging new alliances across generations and sectors to ensure we seize this opportunity for deep, systemic change for women and for the world", said the UN Women Executive Director, Phumzile Mlambo-Ngcuka.

She added "Research shows the **COVID-19 pandemic** is exacerbating pre-existing inequalities and threatening to halt or reverse the gains of decades of collective effort – with just released new data revealing that the pandemic will push 47 million more women and girls below the poverty line. The far-reaching social and economic impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic, including the significant increases in violence against women, threaten to reverse many of the hard-won advances made in the last 25 years to empower women and girls".

Her statement reinforces the increase in **domestic violence** cases here in Milwaukee and Wisconsin.

This month, Zonta members received a call for the ratification of the Istanbul Convention. Zontian Anita Schnetzer-Spranger of **Zonta International's Council of Europe Committee** has written *"The Istanbul Convention is a ground-breaking international treaty to eradicate violence against women and domestic violence. Once ratified it is legally binding and as such unique in the world combating violence against women. The Convention was created by the Council of Europe but it has global outreach. Any state can accede to it or use it as a blueprint for national and regional legislation and policies. The strength of the Convention lies in its comprehensiveness and its commitment to tackling the root causes of violence against women and domestic violence." Since 1995, the United States has had observer status and participates in COE meetings and works closely with COE on specific issues concerning human rights, democracy and the rule of law.* 

Here in the United States, we have not been successful in ratifying the **CEDAW treaty**, adopted in 1979. However, Cities for CEDAW advocates the passing of legislation establishing the principles of CEDAW in cities and towns across the United States. Currently, the **Equal Rights Amendment**, having reached the minimum of 38 states for passage, is in the hands of Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell.
