
Wine pull – We'll be selling bottles of wine for \$20 in the nice SCOUT bags.

Advocacy



Our Sixth Annual Zonta Says No Silent Walk was held on Monday, October 4, beginning and ending at City Hall. We estimate about 75 walkers were in attendance, thus exceeding our numbers from the past couple years. Once again, we got terrific press coverage – substantive segments on TMJ4 and CBS 58 afternoon and evening news, and coverage in the Milwaukee Journal-Sentinel. Several of our walkers, organizers, and speakers were interviewed.



Following the walk, community leaders commented on the issue of domestic violence, especially in this time of COVID and heightened levels of violence and lethality. There were record numbers of homicides in Wisconsin and in Milwaukee in 2020, and the trend continues.

Shawn Mohammed, Associate Director of The Asha Project, spoke on behalf of End Domestic Abuse Wisconsin, the organization that publishes the annual Homicide Report. He was followed by an impressive group: Sargent Theresa Janick, Domestic Violence High Risk Team of the Sensitive Crimes Division, Milwaukee Police Department, District Attorney John Chisholm, Karin Tyler, Family Injury and Violence Prevention Manager, City of Milwaukee Office of Violence Prevention, and Carmen Pitre, President and CEO, Sojourner.

Next year we want to make this a big event. As Carmen Pitre said in her remarks, "this atrium should be filled". Our plan is to start

early next year with a focus on building connections with other organizations that are concerned about the issue and will march with us. We need some new blood on the Committee to get this done!

Thanks to the very hard-working committee that put together this event, and all who showed up and walked with us!

Domestic violence victims remembered with silent walk

Dozens died last year. according to group

The marchers walked silently for a mile through the blocks of downtown Milwaukee.

They held flags, each one carrying the story of someone whose life ended be-cause of domestic violence.

They passed out cards to onlookers, explaining their mission of memorializing victims and their commitment to ending domestic abuse. The Zonta Club of Milwaukee's sixth

annual walk, "Zonta Says NO to Violence Against Women," came at the start of Domestic Violence Awareness Month and less than two weeks after a report found Wisconsin experienced a record number of domestic violence-related homicides in 2020.

Fifty-eight people were killed in acts of domestic violence last year, according to the annual report from End Domestic Abuse Wisconsin.

In addition, eight perpetrators died by suicide and two others were killed by re-sponding law enforcement, for a total of 68 people dying in domestic violence in-cidents, the report found.

Behind every number are a host of loved ones left to grieve — people like Carrie Scott-Haney. Her daughter, Audrey "TuTu" Scott, went missing in 2017 from a downtown bar and was murdered by her ex-boyfriend. Scott-Haney came to Monday's walk

to push for change. She has started a petition to create a "Purple Alert" system for adult women who go missing and have previously been victims of domes-tic violence.

"There's so many people that go miss-ing and when their remains are found it's never determined if it's domestic abuse,

but their families know" that it was, she

Scott-Haney was among the speakers at City Hall, where the nearly 50 marchers gathered after the walk sponsored by Zonta, a women's service organization seeking to end gender-based violence and empower women. Karin Tyler with the city's Office of Vi-

olence Prevention shared some of her personal experiences with domestic

"I am a survivor," she said, her voice

"I am a survivor," she said, her voice choing in the City Hall rotunda. She had been strangled and threat-ened with a gun, and she focused on keeping her children safe, she said. "It infuriates me when I hear people say Why did she stay?" she said, de-scribing how abusers can return again and again, and how women run into barriers when trying to leave.

And men have to be part of the effort

to end domestic abuse, said Shawn Muhammad, director of The Asha Project, which serves African American women in Milwaukee

In order for us to eradicate intimate partner violence it will take all of us, and if the sisters could do it on their own, it yould be eradicated already," he said.

Deaths from domestic violence are the tip of the iceberg, said Carmen Pitre, executive director of Sojourner Family Peace Center.

"What it sits on is thousands of other situations right here in Milwaukee, where people are living in terror, who are suffering and who are living in isolation," she said.

She called on those gathered to reflect on the stories they had carried. She shared how, at one point in the walk, a gust of wind tore her flag from her hands and sent it tumbling down the block.

She chased after it, thinking of the 60-year-old woman honored on it, a

woman only a year older than her.
"She was lost once, she doesn't need
to be lost again," Pitre said.

International Day of Peace - September 21, 2021

The International Day of Peace is observed each year as a day devoted to strengthening the ideals of peace. This year, the United Nations' theme is "Recovering better for an equitable and sustainable world."

The UN explains that as we heal from the COVID-19 pandemic, "we are inspired to think creatively and collectively about how to help everyone recover better, how to build resilience, and how to transform our world into one that is more equal, more just, equitable, inclusive, sustainable and healthier."

Zonta International is dedicated to achieving peace because we cannot realize gender equality and the Sustainable Development Goals without it," said Zonta International President, Sharon Langenbeck, "Today we call for an end to conflict and for the global community to work toward gender-inclusive solutions to the challenges facing our world today."

Around the world, communities are suffering the effects of complex conflicts, humanitarian crises and the COVID-19 pandemic – which is hitting underprivileged and marginalized groups the hardest.



Women are often most impacted by these crises, bearing the brunt of conflict and paying a higher price of the devastation – from increased gender discrimination and violence, to the waning gender-sensitive structures and programing," UN Women said in a recent statement.

Though evidence proves that women's participation in peace processes leads to lasting, positive peace, women are largely excluded from peacebuilding. The COVID-19 crisis has highlighted the full extent of gender inequality in conflict-affected areas and made gender-inclusive approaches even more vital.

Foundation Board Decisions

On Thursday, Sept 21 the Foundation Board met and made its final decisions on agencies and Zonta Foundation for Women giving for the biennium.

Between the PNC bank account and the cash in our Baird brokerage account, we have approximately \$16,500 on hand before tapping into any Baird YTD earnings (our total gains this year were approximately \$29,000 as of Aug 31).

We have a long-standing past practice of donating 1/3 of funds raised in our annual fund-raising event to ZIF projects and scholarships, in line with ZI expectations. The Club 2021 Annual Report reported \$12,500 in funds raised from the 2020 fund-raising auction. The Foundation Board voted to donate \$4150 from Baird cash reserves representing 1/3 of funds raised in the Fall of 2020, as the Board had not authorized that previously

We reviewed the five (5) agencies selected at our Sept 2 meeting and the programs and amounts requested, and we agreed to support the amounts requested. The agencies are, in alphabetical order:

- Alverno College Girls Academy of Science and Mathematics tuition support (\$3000)
- Exploit No More, Inc. Freedom House Long Term Care Facility (\$5000)
- Milwaukee Homeless Veterans Initiative WOVIN (\$5000)
- Milwaukee Muslim Women's Coalition (MMWC) Our Peaceful Home Youth Leadership Program (\$3000)
- Sojourner Hope and Healing (\$5000)

The total donation to agencies, to be presented at the Fashion Show, will be \$21,000.

Therefore, it is the Foundation Board's decision to utilize the Baird cash reserves and liquidate an additional \$9,000 in Baird account investments to execute these decisions.

We also agreed to donate 1/3 of funds raised in the upcoming Fashion Show to the Zonta Foundation for Women, completing our biennium objective.
