Janet Fitch founded New Moon Productions to create a diverse work environment for projects that expand thinking and actions within local, regional and global communities.

The Most Dangerous Women series of documentary shorts is a project of Milwaukee-based New Moon Productions.

It presents the stories of women changemakers and invites viewers to discover and document women in their own families, communities, and regions working towards a more just and equitable world. The pilot episode begins in 1869, when Wyoming becomes the only territory in the world to specifically recognize women's right to vote and to hold elected office, a full 50 years before passage of the Nineteenth Amendment.


Service

Advocacy



The **Racial Justice Committee** has evolved and will now be the **Advocacy Committee**. Our focus will continue to be issues related to Social Justice. In particular we will focus on how to engage men in violence prevention, and how to educate men, women, boys, and girls about the unacceptability of violence in close personal and family relationships.

Diana Barnett and Diane Lindsey will Co-Chair effective immediately.** We thank Donna for her tremendous work as the chair and contributions and leadership. Donna will remain as a member of the Advocacy Committee.

We will continue to work to connect with our community organizations or agencies in this effort beginning with the Alma Center (Donna N.), Exploit No More (Judy), Franciscan Peacemakers (Diane), and Truckers Against Trafficking (Carol). Other Committee members will also add to this effort.

We as the Advocacy Committee will connect and follow the lead of other WI Clubs and Area 2/Distric6 on spring efforts - Madison IWD ERA push and Janesville/workshop Child Marriage. Diane L. will continue to follow and advise the Committee/Club on legislative activity, especially upcoming Human Trafficking issues regarding runaways and Safe Harbor.

Commission on the Status of Women



Of the 6,155 non-governmental organizations (NGOs) with consultative status at the United Nations, only 141 have General Consultative Status, the highest status an NGO can have at the UN. Zonta International was granted General Consultative Status in 1969.

As an NGO with General Consultative Status, Zonta International is invited to participate in the annual Commission on the Status of Women (CSW) in New York. The Commission on the Status of Women is:

- A functional commission of the Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC).
- The principal global intergovernmental body exclusively dedicated to the promotion of gender equality and the empowerment of women.
- Established by resolution on 21 June 1946 to monitor and promote women's rights and develop global standards on gender equality and the empowerment of women; mandate expanded in 1996 to include monitoring and reviewing progress made in the implementation of the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action.

CSW67: 6 – 17 MARCH 2023 @ UN HEADQUARTERS, NEW YORK CITY

- **Priority theme**: Innovation and technological change, and education in the digital age for achieving gender equality and the empowerment of all women and girls.
- **Review theme**: Challenges and opportunities in achieving gender equality and the empowerment of rural women and girls (<u>agreed conclusions</u> of the sixty-second session).

What is CSW?

The CSW is the largest annual gathering on women's rights worldwide, and is the principal global intergovernmental body exclusively dedicated to the promotion of gender equality and the empowerment of women. The CSW is instrumental in promoting women's rights, documenting the reality of women's lives throughout the world, and shaping global standards on gender equality and the empowerment of women.

What happens at CSW?

During the Commission's annual two-week session, thousands of representatives of UN Member States, global civil society organizations and UN entities gather at UN headquarters in New York. They discuss progress and gaps in the implementation of the 1995 <u>Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action</u>, the




key global policy document on gender equality, and the <u>23rd special session of the General Assembly</u> held in 2000 (Beijing+5), as well as emerging issues that affect gender equality and the empowerment of women. Member States agree on further actions to accelerate progress and promote women's enjoyment of their rights in political, economic and social fields. The outcomes and recommendations of each session are forwarded to ECOSOC for follow-up.

Official representatives from member states and civil society can attend the formal CSW meetings and the accompanying side events on women's issues which are sponsored by member states. During the two-week session, NGOCSW, the civil society arm of CSW presents the NGOCSW Forum where hundreds of sessions, known as parallel events are open for all interested parties to attend. Why should I attend CSW?

Attendance at CSW is important as it gives participants the opportunity to: have a voice in exploring solutions to myriad problems facing women of the world; receive a phenomenal educational experience regarding critical issues affecting women worldwide by attending side and parallel events; network with like-minded attendees from all over the globe.


This was a topic raised at our District 6 Fall Conference. Clubs were asked to take advantage of the training opportunities and track the activities of Club members on their quest.


