The Conference commenced with a "Zonta Says No" silent walk at Milwaukee City Hall to remember those that lost their lives in 2021 to domestic violence. Collections were taken at the conference for Hunger Task Force in support of the District 6 service project to fight food poverty. 395 pounds of food was collected! Thank you to all who contributed.

We had a very special guest at the conference, a sister Zontian from Ukraine (name being withheld for confidentiality). It was a true message of the sisterhood shared globally by Zonta. Another highlight from the conference was discussion on Child Marriage and actions that can be taken to introduce and influence legislation to protect girls who are married before age 18. Speakers included Carmen Pitre, Heidi Moore and our District scholarship recipients. And our own Jackie Beaudry was awarded her ZI plaque by Governor Cheryl.

Neu-Life entertained us Saturday evening, where they received several standing ovations! One of the poems brought many of us to tears and was delivered with great passion. We are including his words in this newsletter. Many thanks to Neu-Life.

Thank you to all Milwaukee club members who attended and volunteered during the event. You are much appreciated!





#### Heidi Moore Program Debrief

At our September Club meeting, we conducted a brief review of our work with Heidi Moore Urban Consulting on culture, communication, and conflict. We summarized the work we did with her and then raised the following questions:

- Have meeting locations/formats/seating been impediments to club attendance/growth?
- Meet the need for more active members: 75-100
- Increase Club visibility in the community so that we are recognizable.
  - Develop effective marketing of the Club.
  - Participate in community projects.
  - Partner with other organizations.
  - Meet other needs of agencies which have applied to Foundation for funding
- Etch diversity into all that we do

The Racial Justice Committee will continue to meet, brainstorm, and bring ideas and possible actions to the Club. We hope all members will do likewise. We expect our "Advocacy Committee report" at the next few Club meetings will be interactive.

#### Silent Walk/Domestic Violence Awareness Month

Thanks to all in the Club and District who participated in, invited friends, transported walkers, or helped plan and pull off our 7<sup>th</sup> Annual Zonta Says No to Violence Against Women Silent Walk last Friday, October 7.





The program was noted by many as our most powerful ever. Perhaps because the rate of DV homicides continues to escalate and we continue to witness rising lethality, the speakers' remarks were impactful and heartfelt. Particularly moving were the comments by the mother of a victim, who brought to life the continuing impacts of domestic violence homicide on friends, family, and the community, long after the incident occurs. Press coverage from two local TV stations, WISN and TV 58, gave Zonta very strong acknowledgment, showed many walkers, and highlighted some of the speakers' remarks.

The murdered victims we honored ranged in age from 3 months to 77 years, were male and female, from 21 Wisconsin counties. The after-effects of these killings will be felt for years by their families and communities. We need to do more.

The Silent Walk was a great way to kick off the Fall Conference, and we received highly positive feedback from other Zontians in District 6.

To continue observing Domestic Violence Awareness Month, Donna Kahl-Wilkerson and Donna Neal will be attending a Survivor Panel discussion at Sojourner on Wednesday, Oct 19.

Thursday evening, at 5:15, the Hoan Bridge will be lit in purple to observe DV Awareness Month. Make sure you check it out! We will be considering lighting the bridge orange next year as part of a Zonta Says No event.

#### 16 Days of Activism (November 25 – December 10)

We surfaced our plans for 16 Days of Activism at the September meeting, and we are beginning to execute the plan with this newsletter. To put it simply, **the intent for 16 Days is to surface/publish/spread awareness of initiatives that focus on DV prevention by involving men.** We will never solve this issue unless it becomes a human rights issue, a community health and safety issue, a social justice issue.

We would like members of the Club who care about the issue of DV to participate. Here's the ask:

Zonta is making a difference for women and girls across the globe through international projects and educational awards funded by the Zonta Foundation for Women and through the thousands of service and advocacy initiatives undertaken by Zonta clubs and members in the communities in which they live and work.

<u>UNICEF</u> works in over 190 countries and territories to save children's lives, to defend their rights, and to help them fulfil their potential, from early childhood through adolescence. And they never give up. (ZI Project: Adolescent Girl's Health & Protection – Peru - \$500,000).

<u>UNFPA</u> is the United Nations sexual and reproductive health agency. The mission is to deliver a world where every pregnancy is wanted, every childbirth is safe and every young person's potential is fulfilled. (ZI Project: Strengthening Survivors of Gender Based Violence – Papua New Guinea & Timor-Leste - \$500,000).

<u>UNICEF USA</u> supports UNICEF's global work through fundraising, advocacy and education in the United States. They collaborate with governments and corporations, non- profit groups and social enterprises, civic leaders and celebrities, churches and other faith-based organizations, youth groups and campus groups, teachers and students and families – anyone willing to help us advocate for survival and well-being of every child. (ZI Project: Engaging Girls in Climate Change in Madagascar - \$500,000.)

<u>UNFPA – UNICEF</u> addresses the challenge of girls at risk of early marriage and often those hardest to reach. They come from poor families, marginalized groups or rural areas. They are also more likely to be out of school than their unmarried peers, robbed of the opportunity to thrive and reach their full potential. (ZI Project: Ending Child Marriage in 12 African and Asian Countries – Bangladesh, Burkina Faso, Ethiopia, Ghana, India, Mozambique, Nepal, Niger, Sierra Leone, Uganda, Yemen, Zambia –n \$1,200,000).

#### 2022 Zonta Foundation Grant Recipients

The Club's Foundation Board solicited local agency applications for grants in the spring, with a July 15 deadline for filing, and met three times in August to determine funds available for grants and scholarships, evaluate applications, and agree on agencies and grant amounts. Fifteen (15) applications were received, and seven (7) agencies will be granted awards at our Fall Fashion Show Fundraiser. They are:

#### Exploit No More Freedom House

Exploit No More serves adult female survivors of sex trafficking and sexual exploitation, offering a safe and dignified space and time and means to heal. It is a 6-month program serving 10-16 clients per year, offering survivors of sex trafficking access to resources to meet basic needs (food, showers, beds, laundry services, computers/ internet, phone, personal care items) as well as a traumainformed approach for physical and emotional healing. The grant from Zonta Foundation will help them continue to support the Freedom House 24/7 operations. Zonta Milwaukee Foundation has been following this program's development for over a year and is very impressed with their progress.

#### Milwaukee Muslim Women's Coalition Our Peaceful Home Youth Leadership Program \$3000

Milwaukee Muslim Women's Coalition (MMWC) Our Peaceful Home is a program for young Muslim women and girls who have experienced trauma. It addresses issues of identity, self- esteem, and emotions such as anger and sadness in a practical, culturally specific, and culturally relevant manner. Services include workshops held over six to eight weeks, therapist-facilitated healing circles and circles of support. Youth learn the characteristics of healthy relationships and, with therapist help, acquire tools to overcome personal challenges. The program serves 25-30 youth annually. MMWC is the only organization in Wisconsin that provides culturally specific domestic violence programming for Muslim women.

#### Sojourner Healing Services

Sojourner advocates work one-one with clients to develop Healing Plans: how clients are hoping to heal, grow, or move forward. With a mission to transform lives impacted by domestic violence, Sojourner's first priority is to address the immediate safety concerns of clients. Once a client is safe, life skills and healing plan programming is integrated into conversations. Advocates support clients to explore their passions and goals and identify ways to achieve those goals and address any challenges that may arise. A wide variety of programming options within Hope and Healing ensure that women are empowered to embark on a path that includes goal setting, support groups, job readiness training, financial empowerment, basic adult education and literacy, higher education and scholarship assistance, and professional and leadership training.

#### **CORE/EI Centro Trauma and Healing Services**

CORE El Centro offers healing services for all women no matter what their economic status, cultural background, or religious belief, by providing natural healing therapies to integrate body, mind and spirit in a culturally sensitive environment. The *Trauma* & *Healing Program* is a collaborative venture with

their on-site partner, The Healing Center, which offers adult sexual abuse survivors and their loved one's opportunities for healing and wholeness by providing support and counseling, advocacy and community education. CORE/EI Centro's bodywork services and movement classes offer women a chance to reconnect with their sense of self, their soul, and their sacred power.

#### The Women's Center Waukesha

For 40 years, The Women's Center has provided safety, shelter, and support to adults and children affected by domestic violence, sexual assault, child abuse, and trafficking. The Employment & Life Skills Program promotes self-sufficiency and addresses practical barriers to independence. Clients learn about job opportunities, careers that pay family supporting wages, the job search process, and coping skills to manage multiple roles. The program also offers job-readiness coaching, career development, job seeking assistance, mock interviews, mentoring opportunities, and transportation to career fairs and interviews. Life skills education helps women develop financial goals, create and maintain a budget, find affordable and safe housing, and understand health and wellness through nutrition education.

#### Milwaukee Women's Center Emergency Shelter

Milwaukee Women's Center, A Division of Community Advocates provides innovative, culturally competent holistic care that empowers individuals and families to live safe, independent and healthy lives that is free from domestic violent, addiction and trauma. The *Emergency Shelter* program serves women and children effected by domestic violence. The shelter provides safe housing while offering counseling, support groups, safety planning and comprehensive case management services to address housing and other basic needs. The children participate in age-appropriate trauma-informed programming to increase awareness, prevent the cycle of domestic violence and increase their self-esteem.

#### Franciscan Peacemakers Social Enterprise

Franciscan Peacemakers *Social Enterprise* (SE) program provides employment training to women who are survivors of sexual exploitation and sex trafficking. Participants earn a living wage and learn skills (manufacturing, packaging, marketing, sales and administration) that are transferable to the job market at completion of the program. This program empowers women by giving them control over their ability to earn income in an appropriate, safe and well-paid manner. The SE manufactures a line of all-natural bath and body products that are hand made with all natural ingredients.

#### Foundation Business

The Foundation Board has made it a priority to make sure that our State and Federal non-profit status and associated forms are up-to-date and duly processed. Much work needed to be done and has been successfully completed.

The Foundation Board has also been working diligently to update its disbursement and investment policies. Much progress has been made and more will be reported in next month's newsletter.

#### Zonta Club of Milwaukee Meeting September 28,2022

Meeting called to order by President, Joann Harris-Comodore

A Table Talk of Thanks was offered by Joann Harris-Comodore to all members for their work – and to Carol Mangold and Deb Koller for serving as delegates to the Conference

Laurie Ward, treasurer - financial report, 1<sup>st</sup> to 31<sup>st</sup> - no expenses – Balance 11,329.47 – and the C D as of 6/22 is \$5,420.47

Virtual Meetings /yes, no, or sometimes, as questioned by Barbara Wyatt-Sibley, were discussed, and Joann will notify Barbara, as she will be the person checking out various speakers. The feeling of the group (by a hand vote) was to say, "yes have virtual meetings, but not every time."

There was a suggestion offered by Donna Conant to create a column to write about Great Things Milwaukee Zontians, past and present, have done. The feeling is that it would honor the women and bring out past and present stories, showing that we have had many firsts and exciting projects.

People are needed to sign up for the Zonta Book Store at Conference.

Jackie Beaudry gave the 2022 Zonta International Convention report. The next Convention will be held in Brisbane, Australia in 2024. The last Convention in Australia was in 2006.

The Board talked about the difficult decision to not continue the Women in Technology Scholarship due to the cost, but after much discussion the decision was made to extend the pilot program scholarship for another biennium and change the name to STEM. Individual clubs will determine the level of support.

Donna Neal debriefed our work with Heidi Moore, presenting a short recap with thoughtful questions in a slide presentation. It is hoped that we will continue to learn and work on racial equity in our club.


