## 2022 JMK Women in Business Scholarship

#### Heather Jost is this year's JMK Scholarship recipient. Congratulations!!

In 2016 Heather received her Bachelor's Degrees from Lawrence University in Anthropology and Music Performance. Since graduating from Lawrence, Heather has been employed by Not Forgotten International. Heather's responsibilities with Not Forgotten International included teaching English at refugee camps in Algeria, Rwanda, and Tunisia as well as being a Team Language Coach.

Heather's goal with an MBA from Oxford Said Business School is to use the education, known for its focus on social Impact and diversity, to invest in the Saharawi refugee camps and similar places. In preparation for pursuing her MBA Heather passed with High Honors the CORe Credential of Readiness courses through Harvard Business School.

Heather's work-related reference stated, "The number one way I have seen her intellectual curiosity displayed is her desire to learn a new culture in the Saharawi refugee camps. She had a deep hunger to know more as she learned about the people, the culture, how to fit into society, and how to master the foreign language Hassinya. She truly exceeded expectations and thrived in this new environment through her pursuit of learning and curiosity.


Heather's university-related reference stated, "Heather excelled in the co-curricular Servant Leader Fellows position which involved a variety of activities including library research, reading and discussion of writings on servant leadership, planning a dinner at Lawrence for refugees from central Africa, and planning a web strategy for the Office of Community-Based Research and Learning, among other things."

Heather stated that she believes the interconnectedness of the world requires that practitioners of business excel in their understanding of culture and the ability to deeply understand culture will allow for more honest communication, genuine respect, and project sustainability.

Zonta International is passionate about providing life-changing opportunities for women and girls through international service. By partnering with agencies of the United Nations and other recognized non-governmental organizations, Zonta has improved women's health, provided better economic opportunities, and prevented gender-based violence in 66 countries. Since our first service project, Zonta has contributed more than US\$32.7 million to our international service projects.

### Below are the 2022-2024 Biennium Service Projects:

#### Adolescent Girls' Health and Protection in Peru

We are responding to the health needs of adolescents—especially girls—in a timely manner and preventing violence in schools in Peru.

Education is a human right. It has the power to save and improve the lives of women and girls, which leads to healthier families and stronger communities.

From 2020-2022, Zonta International contributed US\$1,000,000 to UNICEF USA for the project. For the next two years, Zonta has committed US\$750,000 to improve the capacity of services to respond to the health needs of adolescents, in particular adolescent girls, in a timely manner and prevent all forms of violence in schools and other services in Ucayali, Loreto, Huancavelica and Northern Lima.

#### • Her Health and Dignity, Our Priority: Strengthening services for survivors of GBV

We are ensuring that all women and girls in Papua New Guinea and Timor-Leste live life free from violence and providing quality services to those who experience violence.

Building on Phase I, Phase II of Her Health and Dignity, Our Priority: Strengthening services for survivors of gender-based violence will expand the strengthening of skills, knowledge and capacities of GBV responders, including health care providers in additional geographic areas in Papua New Guinea (PNG) and Timor-Leste (TL).

From 2020-2022, Zonta International contributed US\$1,000,000 to UNFPA for the project. For the next two years, Zonta has committed US\$750,000 to ensure that all women and girls who experience violence use quality essential services, including for long-term recovery from violence, in Papua New Guinea and Timor-Leste.

#### Engaging Girls on Climate Change in Madagascar

We are enabling children, particularly girls, to learn in a safe and inclusive environment and empowering them to take actions to build climate-resilient communities.

Engaging Girls on Climate Change in Madagascar will help UNICEF enable children, particularly girls, to learn in a safe and inclusive environment and empower them to take actions to change and to build climate-resilient communities. The targeted beneficiaries are more than 1,000 students (approximately 540 girls), 750 teachers, and residents of school communities in Beloha and Ambovombe districts in the region of Androy, the drought-prone region of the South.

For the next two years, Zonta International has committed US\$500,000 to UNICEF USA to support girls and a generation of children and adolescents by providing environmental education in Madagascar through child-friendly schools.



#### Ending Child Marriage

We are protecting the rights of millions of vulnerable girls and putting an end to this global violation of human rights in 12 countries in Africa and Asia.

Zonta has supported ending child marriage since 2014, contributing US\$2 million to delay early marriage in Niger from 2014-2018. From 2018-2022, Zonta contributed US\$3.5 million to the UNFPA-UNICEF Global Programme to End Child Marriage – the first private-sector donor to the Global Programme. For the next two years, Zonta International has committed US\$1.2 million to UNICEF USA to support Phase II of the project.
