Service

"Make a Difference: Service Opportunities Now Through June"

At our last two club meetings, members voted overwhelmingly to support three agencies and their service projects as proposed by our Club's Service Committee. The three agencies are:

- Allies for Teens in Foster Care: Allies strives to supplement the educational and social needs for teens in foster care and group homes.
- <u>Cathedral Center:</u> Cathedral Center serves unaccompanied women and families with children experiencing homelessness, with emergency shelter and flexible housing up to 2 years.
- **Exploit No More:** Exploit no more continues to house and serve victims of sex trafficking in a powerful case management model.

At our September meeting, Club members strongly supported undertaking the Holiday project of Allies for Teens in Foster Care. Then at our October meeting, Club members voted in support of the 7 proposed projects for these 3 agencies, and the project schedule which takes us through June 2024.



Participation by Members is voluntary, much needed and extremely appreciated! Each of us can effectively improve and touch the lives of women and girls in our community.

Here is an outline of the projects and our timeline:

- November Club and Prospective Member Meeting: Collect holiday gifts for Allies for Teens in Foster Care for a December delivery. See related article for more detail on items needed and how to donate.
- December Social in-person, and into January: Collect sheet sets, blankets, and cleaning/laundry supplies for Exploit No More. More detail to be provided.
- January and go-forward: Organize willing members and begin to tackle the Self-Care topics, research, and binders for Allies Teens in Foster Care.
 - Self-care education: Provide the writing of, and reviews of, educational pamphlets. Topics may range from self-care to how to use tampons. We may wish to create a binder for each group home with the needed resources on a variety of life topics. Club Need: Several members handson remotely for research and collaboration. We will need approval from Allies for the final product(s).
- February: Provide dinner & lunches at Cathedral Center.
 - Cook (or purchase) and serve a meal for 30-50 people at their main shelter and provide 50 sandwiches for the next day's lunch. The cooking is done at home and brought in as there are no cooking facilities at Cathedral. Club Need: Groups of 4-5 hands-on...cooking together and delivering.
- March (tentative): Collect donations for the Allies Art Program.
 - Allies provides many of the group homes with art supplies and sponsored an art contest in May, including a post-educational scholarship winner. Funding support for additional art supplies for 2024 would be appreciated. Requested \$800, and hoping the Club could raise \$300 of that in donations. Also need interested members to lead & coordinate this.
 - May: Provide dinner & lunches to Cathedral Center. (see February for detail)
 - End of May/June: Exploit No More Garden planting & expansion with dinner.
 - Service opportunities: 1) The house is always in need of detergents (laundry, dish) and general cleaning products. Also, sheet sets and blankets for the women to call their own and take with them.
 Meal preparation from time to time.
 Spring garden planting and expansion. Club Need: Donations for #1 and Donations and hands-on for #2 & #3.



Cyber violence against women and girls

With more access than ever to the internet, cyber violence against women and girls (cyber VAWG) has taken on a global dimension.

One of the four Zonta International Service projects receiving funding in the 2022–2024 biennium is the UNFPA-UNICEF Global Program to End Child Marriage - *Driving action to reach the girls at greatest risk*.

In 2016, UNICEF, together with <u>UNFPA</u>, launched a global program to tackle child marriage in 12 of the most high-prevalence or high-burden countries: Bangladesh, Burkina Faso, Ethiopia, Ghana, India, Mozambique, Nepal, Niger, Sierra Leone, Uganda, Yemen and Zambia.

The girls at greatest risk of child marriage are often those hardest to reach. They come from poor families, marginalized groups or rural areas. They are also more likely to be out of school than their unmarried peers, robbed of the opportunity to thrive and fulfil their potential. Child marriage can lead to further isolation from family, friends and communities, and threaten girls' livelihood and health.



<u>A UNICEF PRESS RELEASE NEW YORK - 3 May 2023</u> – Despite a steady decline in child marriage in the last decade, multiple crises including conflict, climate shocks, and the ongoing fallout from COVID-19 are threatening to reverse hard-earned gains, according to a new analysis issued by UNICEF today.

"The world is engulfed by crises on top of crises that are crushing the hopes and dreams of vulnerable children, especially girls who should be students, not brides," said UNICEF Executive Director Catherine Russell. "Health and economic crises, escalating armed conflicts, and the ravaging effects of climate change are forcing families to seek a false sense of refuge in child marriage. We need to do everything in our power to ensure that their rights to an education and empowered lives are secured."

Worldwide, an estimated 640 million girls and women alive today were married in childhood, or 12 million girls per year, according to the latest global estimate included in the analysis. The share of young women who married in childhood has declined from 21 per cent to 19 per cent since the last estimates were released five years ago. However, despite this progress, global reductions would have to be 20 times faster to meet the <u>Sustainable Development Goal of ending child marriage by 2030.</u>

<u>Sub-Saharan Africa</u> – which currently shoulders the second largest global share of child brides (20 per cent) – is over 200 years away from ending the practice at its current pace. Rapid population growth, alongside ongoing crises, looks set to increase the number of child brides, in contrast with the declines expected in the rest of the world.

Latin America and the Caribbean is also falling behind and on course to have the second-highest regional level of child marriage by 2030. After periods of steady progress, the Middle East and North Africa, and Eastern Europe and Central Asia have also stagnated.

Meanwhile, <u>South Asia</u> continues to drive global reductions and is on pace to eliminate child marriage in about 55 years, the report notes. However, the region remains home to nearly half (45 per cent) of the world's child brides. While <u>India</u> has recorded significant progress in recent decades, it still accounts for one-third of the global total.



Girls who marry in childhood face immediate and lifelong consequences. They are less likely to remain in school, and face an increased risk of early pregnancy, in turn increasing the risk of child and maternal health complications and mortality. The practice can also isolate girls from family and friends, and exclude them from participating in their communities, taking a heavy toll on their mental health and well-being.

Worldwide, conflict, climate-related disasters, and the ongoing impacts of COVID-19 – especially rising poverty, income shocks, and school dropout – are helping to increase the drivers of child marriage while also making it difficult for girls to access health care, education, social services and community support that protect them from child marriage.

As a result, girls living in fragile settings are twice as likely to become child brides as the average girl globally, the analysis notes. For every ten-fold increase in conflict-related deaths, there is a 7 per cent increase in the number of child marriages.

At the same time, extreme weather events driven by climate change increase a girl's risk, with every 10 per cent deviation in rainfall connected to around a 1 per cent increase in the prevalence of child marriage.

Precious gains to end child marriage in the past decade are also being threatened – or even reversed – by the ongoing impacts of COVID-19, the analysis warns. It is estimated that the pandemic has already cut the number of averted child marriages since 2020 by one-quarter.

"We've proven that progress to end child marriage is possible. It requires unwavering support for vulnerable girls and families," added Russell. "We must focus on keeping girls in school and making sure they have economic opportunities."



Notes to editors: Estimates of the global and regional prevalence of child marriage are calculated on the basis of national estimates in the UNICEF global databases, comprised of nationally representative data from over 100 countries. National data on child marriage are primarily drawn from household surveys, including the UNICEF-supported Multiple Indicator Cluster Surveys (MICS) and the USAID-supported Demographic and Health Surveys (DHS). Demographic data are drawn from the United Nations Department of Economic and Social



Zonta Club of Milwaukee General Meeting Minutes September 27, 2023

The meeting at the Brass Key Restaurant was called to order at 6:10 by President, Joann Comodore.

Gloria Jones gave the blessing.

STEM scholarship recipient, Valentina Romero-Moran, thanked the club and spoke about her chosen field of architecture.

Laureen Ward presented the financial report. Checking account balance as of 9/27/23 is \$11,890.48 and the CD value is \$5,431.05. The detailed report was emailed to each member.

Barbara Wyatt-Sibley introduced our guest speaker, Celia Jackson, who gave a presentation on Vision Zero, a multi-national road traffic safety project and the Coalition for Safe Driving with goals of increasing participation in driver education programs and a campaign to increase awareness of the need for safe driving.

Donna Neal and Carol Mangold were voted in as delegates to the District 6 Fall Conference in Alton, Il October 6-8, with Pam Knackert as an alternate.

Jackie Beaudry explained the deliberations at the Hamburg International Convention regarding continuation of the pilot program, Women in STEM Scholarship. The International Board expressed concern about continued funding of the scholarship.

District 6 will vote at the Fall Conference on the following resolution:

"District 6 moves to amend Zonta International Bylaws Article XIII Committees by changing the number of Section 15 to Section 16 and adding a new Section 15 with the following content:

Section 15. Women in STEM Scholarship Committee. From submissions put forward by districts this committee shall select and recommend to the Zonta International Board candidates for annual Zonta International Women in STEM scholarships."

Janet Kloser moved that the Milwaukee Club vote in favor of the resolution to be voted on by our delegates at the District 6 Fall Conference. The club voted unanimously to approve the resolution. The club also voted to request clarification of the wording (biennial vs biennium) in the by-laws.

Joann discussed the future of the Silent Walk. It will not be held this Fall. Donna Neal reported that all of the partners who participate in the walk have been notified. Suggestions included moving the event to Spring and partnering with other organizations. Donna Neal recommended that a small group be formed to research possibilities. Lynne Oehlke, Donna Kahl, Donna Neal and Chris Todd volunteered. Joann emphasized that the event will require participation of the entire club.
