<u>Service</u>

Service Update, September 7, 2023

Our summer Service activities are showing good progress and some real results!

We undertook two service projects this summer:

- In June, Milwaukee Club members did a gardening project for Exploit No More (purchased, installed and planted raised garden beds) and provided dinner to the residents. "Exploit No More" is dedicated to see all survivors of sex trafficking treated with dignity and have access to safe housing, supportive services and the ability to move forward to work toward their goals." They are also one of the five agencies we identified as "high priority" for our service. (Photos below)
- Neu-Life Back-to-School Service Project: At the April 26th club meeting, members agreed to again support the Neu-Life Backpack Project this year. We collected 50 backpacks with supplies for the kindergarten and elementary children which were distributed on July 28th at their annual back to school party. "Neu-Life" is a near-north side nonprofit providing year-round educational and recreational programs for youth, from early childhood to young adults."



Future Plans

Service Committee representatives met with several organizations that we ranked highest among the 19 agencies that applied for Zonta Foundation grants in 2021 and 2022, to determine potential future service projects or partnerships.

We looked at the mission, vision, activities, and service needs of the 19 applicant organizations, and identified these 5 as top with respect to aligning with our Zonta mission and our club's service areas of interest. Based on member feedback we are looking at more "hands-on"/ or "in-person" service activities.

We are planning an upcoming meeting with Service Committee Representatives to discuss the opportunities and a plan to bring to the Club.







2023 Zonta Club of Milwaukee STEM Scholarship Recipient

Valentina Romero-Moran is this year's Zonta Club of Milwaukee's STEM Scholarship recipient. As an architecture student with a deep passion for sustainability and a strong belief in community and people-centered design, her academic and professional goals revolve around creating innovative and environmentally conscious spaces that positively impact individuals and their surroundings. She passionately believes that architecture can shape our lives and that humans and nature can learn how to co-exist.

Valentina's goals are her dreams, and she wants to join the 1% of Latinas who are licensed architects. She actively seeks opportunities to expand her knowledge and skills beyond the classroom by attending lectures and being an active participant and now officer of the Society of Hispanic Professional Engineers. These experiences have broadened her understanding of sustainable design principles and have practical insights that she can apply in her future career.

Valentina's academic reference wrote: "In addition to her impressive academic and professional résumé, Valentina is particularly deserving of this scholarship due to her consistency in breaking through barriers that would more typically prevent students from seeking and obtaining such success in higher education and in general. It has been quite rare in my experience to witness such academic achievement considering how the odds may be against her especially as a woman in a STEM field, first generation, student of color, and recent immigrant with socioeconomic challenges. Valentina is simply exceptional, and it has been such a joy to work with her."



Foundation Updates



2023 Grant Recipients

Exploit No More's mission is to respond to the impact of sex trafficking through community education, housing, and supportive services. Exploit No More's vision is to be dedicated to seeing all survivors of sex trafficking treated with dignity and have access to safe housing, supportive services, and the ability to move forward to work toward their goals. Funds from the Zonta Foundation will help them continue their 24/7 operations of Freedom House, a remodeled apartment building that provides a warm and safe bedroom to sleep in, good food to eat, a hot shower, laundry, personal care items, and individualized case management services. Guests at Freedom House regularly say that staying there and benefitting from the services "saved their life."



Milwaukee Muslim Women's Coalition's mission is to lead positive community change through advocacy, dialogue, education, and outreach, using faith-based values to ensure dignity and equity for all. Their vision is a world that nurtures women and girls and empowers them to reach their fullest potential. Funds from the Zonta Foundation will support their Girls Hoops Club, an important addition to their Youth Leadership Program. Sports participation is known to increase confidence, improve health, and enhance academic success. The Girls Hoops Club will further support the mental health and physical wellbeing of Muslim girls and young women who are part of Milwaukee's immigrant and refugee communities.



<u>SOJOURNER</u> Sojourner Family Peace Center's mission is to transform lives impacted by domestic violence. Their core program areas focus on crisis response, systems advocacy, and healing services. They strive to ensure the safety of survivors of domestic violence and provide a pathway out through opportunities to make positive and lasting changes for survivors and their children. Funds from the Zonta Foundation will support their Healing Services, which provides resources, support, and assistance to achieve personal goals and selfsufficiency. Specialized programming is designed for children and teens who have witnessed family violence. Healing Services offers referrals to survivors in many forms related to education, employment, financial empowerment, and wellness.

CORE

El Centro CORE El Centro's mission is to enhance the health and wellness of our communities by offering integrative natural health services focused on empowerment, healing, safety, and reducing barriers to access. CORE El Centro is a grass-roots organization by and for Latin woman and families in Milwaukee's nature-deprived, low-income, underserved neighborhoods. Low-income and minority communities in Milwaukee experience systemic inequities in health care, higher exposure to health threats, and worse health outcomes. Funds from the Zonta Foundation will support women in low-income households accessing an array of Trauma & Healing services including holistic natural therapies, health navigation, and health and wellness education and fitness classes.

Weeklad Hot Bark The **Milwaukee Women's Center**'s mission is to provide innovative, culturally competent, holistic care. The agency's vision is to serve and support individuals and families so they can live their lives free from domestic violence, addiction, and trauma. Funds from the Zonta Foundation will support the Domestic Violence Emergency Shelter Program serving women and their children who have been affected by domestic violence in Milwaukee County. The Shelter provides safe housing and supportive services, including counseling and support groups, safety planning, and comprehensive case management to address housing and other basic needs. In addition, children participate in age-appropriate trauma-informed programming to increase their awareness and prevent the cycle of domestic violence and to increase their safety planning and self-esteem.



The **Cathedral Center**'s mission is to provide a safe environment for women and families, while working to end homelessness-one life at a time. Funds from the Zonta Foundation will support their employment program called the Women's Independence Program (WIP). Its purpose is to empower women and parents who are facing a housing crisis to achieve their fullest potential. WIP weaves professional case management, a stable and supportive living environment, courses on work readiness and personal growth, meaningful incentives, and access to a network of actively engaged employer partners. With a focus on employment, WIP is designed to improve the economic status of women, resulting in increased income and long-term independence and financial stability.



Awesome Young Authors has a mission to empower and encourage children in their literacy and literary journey by providing various programs and initiatives. They believe that education can be a powerful catalyst for change. Their Empowerment Through Education Program aims to provide women and girls with access to quality education and development opportunities to overcome barriers, gain independence, and contribute to the socio-economic development of their communities. Funds from the Zonta Foundation will improve the Program by expanding outreach and providing scholarships, improving the quality of educational resources, training materials, and facilities, and forging new partnerships with schools, vocation training centers, and community organizations.



Zonta International UNICEF USA 2022 – 2024 \$5000,000 Project Engaging Girls on Climate Change in Madagascar Girls

The goal of the Zonta International project is to support girls and a generation of children and adolescents by providing environmental education in Madagascar through child friendly schools in Beloha and Ambiovombe districts in the region of Androy, the drought prone region in the South.


The project will not only provide immediate and short-term impact, but also create robust enabling environments in which successful projects can be replicated at scale and be sustained in the long- term, thereby multiplying the impact on women, girls and boys over time.

Environmental conditions leading to this project.

Located off the coast of East Africa in the Indian Ocean, Madagascar is the second-largest island country in the world. It covers an area of t 592,800 sq. kilometers.

Madagascar is a poor country, and climate change adaptation is costly. Protecting the country's unique ecosystems is considered a central adaptation strategy.





Madagascar finds itself a victim of climate change. There are recurrent waves of drought in the south. The water sources dry up. and all the means of subsistence become almost impossible. Southern populations are bearing the weight of climate change which they did not participate in creating.

Agriculture in Madagascar is being affected by climate change, with smallholder farmers extremely vulnerable to its impacts. The effects of climate change on agriculture, such as increased drought, greatly threatens Madagascar's population, 80% of which relies on agriculture for livelihood.


The severe 2021–2022 Madagascar famine, which followed the worst drought in four decades, has been linked to climate change by the United Nations and media commentators, with poverty, poor infrastructure and high dependence on rain-fed agriculture being primary factors.

Water supply in Madagascar is poor, with a 2018 estimate suggesting that 66% of the population in rural areas and 49% in urban areas lack access to drinking water. Madagascar was facing one of the world's most severe water crises as of 2021 due to poor water management infrastructure, deforestation, erosion and saltwater intrusion. Decreases in annual rainfall,

increased evapotranspiration and sea level rise are projected to further reduce water availability across much of the country. Water in Southern Madagascar, where groundwater is the primary water source during the dry season, are likely to be severely affected as water becomes further limited.

Climate change also has significant implications for health in Madagascar. The incidence of respiratory infections and diarrhea is increasing and these, along with malaria and malnutrition, are expected to increase in the 21st century due to climate change. Cholera outbreaks and malnutrition as well have been linked to climate change.
