Since 1976, February has been designated Black History Month, a time dedicated to publicly recognizing the present, and those who have gone before us for their strength and perseverance. Black history is more than just about learning the challenges confronted by people of color, it is also about the ability to demonstrate integrity, leadership, and determination in the face of adversity.

This month we salute our Zontian Sister, Ardie Halyard. Ardie and husband Wilbur Halyard founded Columbia Savings and Loan Association on September 24, 1924. It was the first African American owned bank in Wisconsin. The bank was founded in an era of racial segregation and discrimination. Although the struggles were many, the Halyard's felt strongly that they could make a difference by

providing financial services to the underserved community of color. Ardie endured to become the first female president of a financial institution in Wisconsin.

Ardie joined the Zonta Club of Milwaukee in 1966 and maintained membership until her death, embracing and contributing to Zonta's Mission of Empowering Women and Girls Worldwide through Service and Advocacy.

Let us remember and give recognition to the past, as we continue to move forward continually seeking equality, diversity, and inclusivity.

Moving forward in this new year, the 2024-2026 Nominating Committee was formed at our January Club meeting and are seeking to fill Club and Foundation Board positions for the 2024-2026 Biennium, which begins June 1. 

Advocacy

February is Black History Month and so we celebrate the life of Zontian Ardie Clark Halyard, a member of our Club from 1966 until her death in 1989. The following article contains excerpts from *The Shepherd Express* of Sept. 06, 2023.

Ardie and husband Wilbur arrived in Milwaukee in 1923 when available houses were "unsafe hand-me-downs



with leaky roofs, structural damage and non-functioning toilets. Worse, unscrupulous predators found ways to deter people from living anywhere but rooming houses and small hotels. They believed that a small, community savings and loan would help residents avoid the sharks who preyed on their own people. The first of several setbacks occurred when an unethical attorney charged them \$500 for a bank charter that cost \$10. They also discovered that white realtors worked in tandem to keep Black families confined to a designated area of town. Undaunted, the Halyards pushed on and in September 1924 the Columbia Savings and Loan opened in a north side funeral parlor's spare room. The initial clients liked the Halyards' straightforward, honest way of doing business, and the positive word began to spread."

"Their message of 'we're all in this together, so let's work for each other' helped pull people together in a way like never before. As increasing numbers of residents were motivated to save for a home. When the I-43 freeway construction cleared large parcels of land in Bronzeville, Ardie and her staff saw an opportunity to create a subdivision with new homes at the site. As the only investor, Columbia financed the first five homes, breaking ground in November 1976. Ultimately 35 more homes were built in what was named Halyard Park."

Ardie became the first woman president of the Milwaukee chapter of the NAACP in 1951. She remained active in the NAACP in other capacities, often as treasurer. She was also a member of the Wisconsin Governor's Commission on the Status of Women. In 1983 she was awarded the Public Service Recognition Award from the United Negro College Fund. As part of her legacy, there is a park, city street and neighborhood, Halyard Park, named after her and her husband in Milwaukee

Ardie passed away in 1989 at the age of 92 and was buried with her husband in Forest Home Cemetery. The Halyards' vision and unwavering efforts to achieve it are inspiring others to follow the path they blazed 100 years ago."

This year – 2024- is the 100th Anniversary of Columbia Savings and Loan.

Human Trafficking Legislation Updates

As some of you may know, the Wisconsin State Assembly held public hearings in 2023 for both Representatives and Senators to learn more about human trafficking in Wisconsin. This has led to the introduction of ten bills in the Assembly and four bills in the Senate. Some of the bills include the following issues:

 AB 977: requiring human trafficking prevention instruction in certain grades and teacher training related to identifying victims of child trafficking; referred to the Committee on Education; no further information



- AB 981: the instruction on human trafficking in licensed schools of barbering, schools of cosmetology, and specialty schools; referred to the Jobs, Economy, & Small Business Development Committee; no further information
- AB 974: the civil causes of action for human trafficking and trafficking a child; recommended for passage
- AB 971: human trafficking of adults at risk for the purpose of commercial sex acts and providing a
 penalty; recommended for passage
- AB 972: solicitation for prostitution and providing a penalty; recommended for passage
- AB 976: the testimony of a child in a criminal proceeding for a human trafficking crime; recommended for passage
- AB 978: the creation of a Human Trafficking Council and requiring the establishment of county sex trafficking task forces; recommended for passage
- AB 979: creation of a human trafficking victim services grant program, granting rule-making authority, and making an appropriation; recommended for passage
- AB 980: displaying a human trafficking resource center hotline poster; referred to the Jobs, Economy, &
 Small Business development Committee; no further information
- SB 940: mandatory training regarding human trafficking for employees of community-based residential
 facilities and owners of certain entities and certain other employees and granting rule-making authority;
 referred to the Judiciary & Public safety Committee; no further information

Please note that there has been no bill addressing Safe Harbor for minors who have been trafficked. As bills are reconciled between the Assembly & Senate and then scheduled for a vote, I will let you know what actions we should take.

UN Report – February 2024

Amelia Earhart - Amelia Earhart was a Zontian when her plane vanished in 1937, and Zonta International in 2023 gave thirty \$10,000 each awards in her honor to women doing graduate work in air or space fields. Over the years, there have been many attempts to locate the lost plane, and Earhart's fate has been the source of speculation and conspiracy theories since her mysterious disappearance in 1937. Now, Amelia Earhart's aircraft is believed to have been found potentially solving a great mystery in aviation history.

Tony Romeo, a former Air Force Intelligence officer and CEO of Deep Sea Vision, and his team in December 2023 reviewed sonar data caught by an underwater drone from his research voyage and found a startling image: a blurry, plane-like shape Romeo believes is Amelia Earhart's twin engine Lockheed 10E Electra.

The image was taken about 100 miles from Howland Island halfway between Australia and Hawaii. Earhart and her navigator were expected to land there in July 1937 for a refueling stop in her bid to be the first female pilot to circumnavigate the globe. She was declared dead after two years when the U.S. concluded she had crashed somewhere in the Pacific Ocean and her remains were never found.

In 2010, a former NASA employee and amateur pilot, Liz Smith, suggested that Amelia's navigator, Fred Noonan, miscalculated his celestial star navigation by simply forgetting to turn back the date from July 3 to July 2 as they flew across the dateline creating a westward navigational error of 60 miles. Deep Sea Vision (DSV), a Charleston, South Carolina based marine robotics company, has been pursuing the missing aircraft using Liz Smith's "Date Line theory" of her disappearance nearly 87 years ago.

As a private pilot, DSV's CEO, Tony Romeo and his brother Lloyd Romero, believed Smith's idea had merit and began digging deeper into the celestial math Smith had laid out. The brothers came to believe that after 17 hours of exhausting flying, it was quite plausible that Earhart's navigator, Fred Noon, could have made such an error. The theory and area described by Smith had never been searched, until now.


The Deep Sea Vision team proved that diligent effort and next-generation technology could take on the monumental task of finding Earhart's Lockheed Electra. For 90 days, the DSV team researched across 5,200 miles of the Pacific Ocean floor. Their secret weapon, the HUGIN 6000 is an autonomous underwater marvel, modified to outperform any underwater submersible used before. It is the most capable system available in the world to reach full ocean depth. Further modifications by DSV allowed the side sonar scan to search nearly 1,600 meter-wide swaths instead of the normal 450 meters.

The team launched the expedition out of a tiny island in the Pacific Ocean, about a four-day cruise from where the discovery was made. Each dive of the sonar equipment lasted nearly two days and collected several terabytes of data scanning the sea floor. The international team worked around the clock, analyzing the imagery using cutting edge software that was being written as the mission went along.

DSV believes they are one step away from closure to this great mystery! Many prominent authorities have been working to validate DSV's findings. DSV plans to return to the site this year or early next year with a camera and remotely operated vehicle to snap better pictures.

Program: Guest speaker, Jessica Rowden, a representative of Women in Aviation International spoke about the history and accomplishments of the organization. The goal of the organization is to open the traditionally male dominated field of aviation and aerospace to more women with opportunities for careers as pilots, air traffic controllers, mechanics, dispatchers and more. The International organization currently has 17,000 members, an active youth program and scholarships for aviation and aerospace careers.

Joann reminded members of the Convention on the Status of Women (CSW) in New York City this March 11-22. A Zoom option is available for those not able to attend in person. Registration is online.

Nominating Committee: Helen Ludwig, Pam Knackert and Barbara Wyatt Sibley volunteered to serve on the nominating committee for the 2024-2026 biennium. The committee will try to recruit one more member.

Treasurer Report: Laureen Ward reported that the checking account balance on 12/29/23 was \$11,437.43. Dues for new members have been paid. The CD is \$5,431.05. Please refer to her submitted report for details.

Advocacy: The focus is on finding a replacement for the Silent Walk event related to gender-based violence. A possible theme is Silent No More. The committee is researching what domestic violence programs are happening in Milwaukee schools.

Service: Maureen S. Asked for volunteers to prepare and serve food for the Cathedral Center. A new date will be selected.

Program: The February 28th meeting will be virtual. The program speaker will be Walter Lanier of the African American Leadership Alliance of Milwaukee (AALAM). The March General Meeting will be in person on March 27 at the Brass Key.

Fashion Show: Pam is planning a committee meeting on February 20th. The date of the event is to be determined based on the date of the Fall Conference. The final figure for the Fall 2023 Fashion Show was \$30,360, the largest proceeds to date.
