Presidents Message.....

Dear Sister Zontians:

In the month of February each year we celebrate Black History. One of the pioneer women and arguably one of the most influential African-American women of all time is Sojourner Truth. Let's learn a little bit about her and how her name ties in with the Zonta Club of Milwaukee.

Sojourner Truth was born Isabella Baumfree in upstate New York to slave parents in a family of 13 children. As a child she had numerous owners, nearly all of whom were cruel and abusive. Forced into a marriage with an older slave when she was barely 20, she gave birth to five children before she was 30. Just prior to New York's abolition of slavery in 1827, she escaped with her infant daughter, Sophia, and sought refuge with a kind family. A year later, with the help of friends, she legally obtained her youngest son, Peter, who had been illegally sold into slavery in the South.

In 1843, believing she received a calling from God, she changed her name to Sojourner Truth. Moved by her new religious mission, she traveled to prayer meetings, churches, and religious rallies throughout New England witnessing for the Lord. While in Massachusetts, she became acquainted with the abolitionist movement through civil rights leaders William Lloyd Garrison and Frederick Douglass. It was also during this time that she became involved with the women's suffrage movement.

For the duration of her adult life, Sojourner Truth spoke out about the social injustice and inequality experienced by African-Americans and women. With the help of friends, she wrote and published her memoirs, and spoke at abolitionist gatherings. She lobbied for land to be set aside in the West for free blacks after the Civil War, and successfully helped conduct a campaign for integrated streetcars in Washington D.C. From the depths of slavery, Sojourner Truth built a reputation for her powerful oration, and her deeply emotional life story inspired thousands of Americans to rethink their definition of equality.

Now how does this tie in with Zonta? I'm glad you asked.

Sojourner Truth House, which is a shelter that provides a safe and secure environment and a respite from violence for women and children (the Zonta Mission).

Services are offered using a case management approach, including job readiness training, parenting education, and support groups. Programming is also provided to children residing at Sojourner Truth House.

These programs are provided on-site and include: preschool enrichment, support groups, academic enrichment, individual case management for parents, assessment, individual counseling and referrals.

In February of 2009, the Task Force on Family Violence and Sojourner Truth House joined together to form a single organization, Sojourner Family Peace Center. This merger now provides a more effective and efficient way to provide necessary services to domestic violence victims.

The Zonta Club of Milwaukee has supported and will continue to support the Sojourner Truth Peace Center through service and advocacy to advance the status of women both locally and worldwide.

February is upon us and Valentine's Day is just around the corner. Hopefully this means that the worst of winter is behind us. For most clubs, it means they are gearing up for spring events such as fundraisers, hosting Spring Workshop, or organizing a service/advocacy project. If your club is looking for a service/advocacy project I have an idea.

As a cardiologist, I'd be remiss not to mention February as National Heart Month. Heart and vascular diseases are the leading cause of death in BOTH men and women. One in three women has some form of these diseases and almost ½ the heart attack deaths in the US are in women. It's not just an "old women's problem" either. In women 45-64, it's the second leading cause of death and in women 24-44 it's the third leading cause of death.

As a service organization with a mission to improve women's health, heart disease is the elephant in the room when it comes to thinking about a new service project. There are numerous opportunities for us to help ourselves and others. And you don't have to do it alone.

The American Heart Association(AHA), Centers for Disease Control(CDC), and the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute(NHLBI) all have campaigns and resources to tap into when looking for a project. The AHA's Go Red for Women campaign encourages women to empower themselves with information and the NHLBI's Heart Truth Campaign make the Red Dress a national symbol of heart disease recognition in women.

seminars, town hall meetings, and wellness walks. The
NHLBI's website www.nhlbi.nih.gov/education/hearttruth/get-involved/event-ideas.htm will give you
several ideas such as:

- Sponsor a Red Dress Fashion Show
- Host a Heart Health Luncheon/Dinner
- Sponsor a Heart Health Free Clinic for underserved women
- Set up a display on women's heart health at a local library
